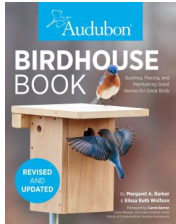


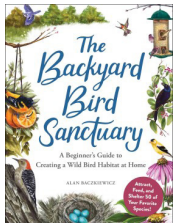
For the Birds

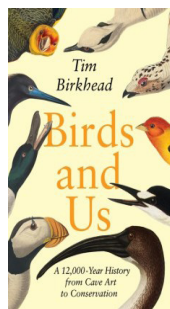
Birdgirl: Looking to the Skies in Search of a Better Future by Mya-Rose Craig

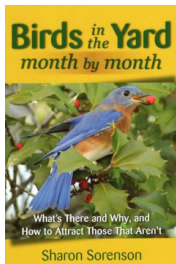
Birding Basics: Tips, Tools, & Techniques for Great Birdwatching by Noah Strycker

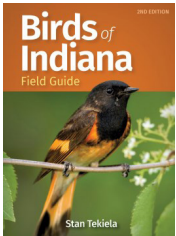
Birds and Us by Tim Birkhead

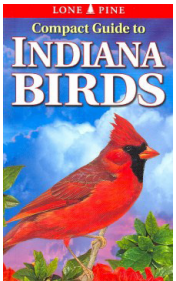
***Birds in the Yard Month by Month* by Sharon Sorenson**

Learn to identify birds in Indiana with this simple and informative book. Featuring 118 species of Indiana birds, this guide is organized by color for ease of use.



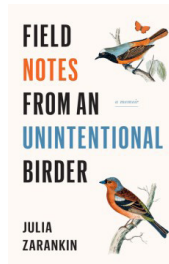
***Compact Guide to Indiana Birds* by Kenneth J. Brock**

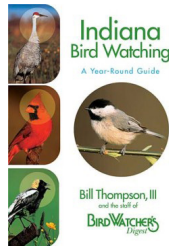
***Endangered and Disappearing Birds of the Midwest* by Matt Williams**

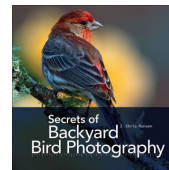
***Field Notes From an Unintentional Birder: A Memoir* by Julia Zarankin**
