Burt is an alien from a distant galaxy with advanced technology, but an accident has made his parents disappear and trapped him on Earth. But when Burt embarks on a plan to teleport home once and for all and ventures into the cold all alone, his foster mother Lydia will have to find a way to bridge the gulf between them.



The Glorkian Warrior Delivers a Pizza by James Kochalka (J-GN Glorkian Warriorv.1)

The Glorkian Warrior isn't the brightest bulb in the box, so it's good he's got his trusty talking backpack to advise him as they set out on a perilous journey to deliver a pizza.



Little Robot by Ben Hatke (J-GN Hatke Little Robot)

When a girl finds a lost robot in the woods, they become fast friends, but they're both in for an adventure when a much larger, menacing robot comes to retrieve it.



Pluto Rocket: New in Town by Paul Gilligan (J-GN Pluto Rocket v. 1)

An unlikely friendship forms between a street-smart pigeon and an out-of-thisworld visitor.



Waffles and Pancake, Book 1: Planetary-Yum by Drew Brockington (J-Gn Waffles and Pancake v.1)


Future CatStronaut Waffles and his younger sister Pancake are kittens who enjoy visiting the science museum with Dad–Cat.

A story that explores new worlds packed with amazing adventures; ancient mysteries; the unlikely bond of a clumsy dancer, a boy from the poorest slums, and a superstar athlete—and their quest to save one small, distant galaxy from the forces of evil.



Animorphs, Volume 1: The Invasion by Chris Grine (J-GN Animorphs v.1)

Sometimes weird things happen to people. Ask Jake. He could tell you about the night he and his friends saw a strange light in the sky that seemed to be heading right for them. That was the night five normal kids learned that humanity is under a silent attack—and were given the power to fight back.




Cog by Greg Van Eekhout (Juvenile Fiction—J Vaneekh)


Dragon Pearl by Yoon Ha Lee (Juvenile Fiction–J Lee)

The Giver by Lois Lowry (Juvenile Fiction—J Lowry)

Given his lifetime assignment at the Ceremony of Twelve, Jonas becomes the receiver of memories shared by only one other in his community. Then, he discovers the terrible truth about the society in which he lives.



Grace Needs Space by Benjamin A Wilgus (J-GN Wilgus Grace Needs Space)

Grace's excitement to accompany her "fun" mom on delivery to Titan quickly turns to frustration when her mom is too preoccupied with her mission to spend time with Grace, yet when their ship stops working on their return home it is up to Grace to save the day.



Hilo. 1, The Boy Who Crashed to Earth by Judd Winick (J-GN Hilo v.1)

When a mysterious boy falls from the sky, friends D.J. and Gina must discover the secrets of his identity and help him save the world.



Klawde: Evil Alien Warlord Cat by Johnny Marciano (Juvenile Fiction–J Marcian)

Klawde, the exiled ruler of the planet Lyttyrboks, and Raj, who just moved from Brooklyn to tiny Elba, Oregon, forge an unlikely friendship as they find their footing in a strange new world.




The Last Beekeeper by Pablo Cartaya (Juvenile Fiction–J Cartaya)

In a future shaken by climate disasters, Yolanda Cicerón knows that nature is something to be feared. She dreams of leaving her farm to live in Silo—the most advanced town for miles around. But first, Yoly will need to prove she belongs.



Ruby Finley Vs. The Interstellar Invasion by K. Tempest Bradford (Juvenile Fiction–J Bradfor)

11-year-old Ruby, a Black girl who loves studying insects, accidentally captures an alien bug, but when the creature escapes and starts wreaking havoc around the neighborhood, it is up to Ruby and her rag—tag group of friends to find this new invasive species before the feds do.



Sal and Gabi Break the Universe by Carlos Hernandez (Juvenile Fiction–J Hernand)

In order to heal after his mother's death, 13-year-old Sal learns to reach into time and space to retrieve things—and people—from other universes.



The Strangers by Margaret Peterson Haddix (Juvenile Fiction–J Haddix)

Told from separate viewpoints, Chess, Emma, and Finn Greystone investigate why their mother went missing and uncover their ties to an alternate world.



The Wild Robot by Peter Brown (Juvenile Fiction–J Brown)

Roz the Robot discovers that she is alone on a remote, wild island with no memory of where she is from or why she is there. Her only hope of survival is to try to learn about her new environment from the island's hostile inhabitants.



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
