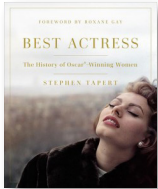


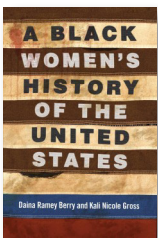

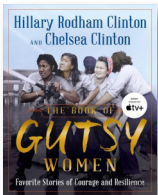
March is Women's History Month! Celebrate the accomplishments of women in the arts, religion, human rights, politics, science, and every other aspect of the human experience.



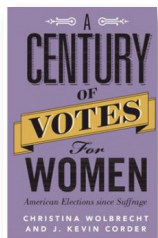
Best Actress by Stephen Tapert

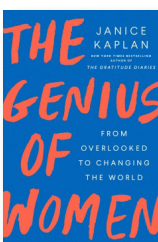
A Black Women's History of the United States by Daina Ramey Berry

In centering Black women's stories, two award-winning historians seek both to empower African American women and to show unique ability to make their own communities while combating centuries of oppression.



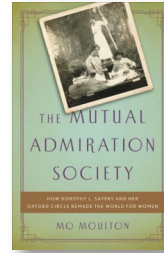
The Book of Gutsy Women by Hillary Rodham Clinton and Chelsea Clinton

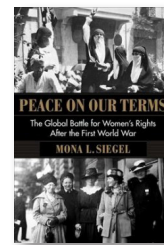
A Century of Votes for Women by Christina Wolbrecht and J. Kevin Corder

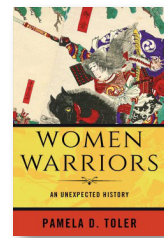
The Mutual Admiration Society by Mo Moulton

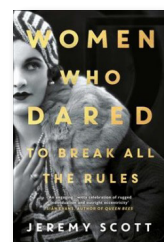
Peace On Our Terms by Mona L. Siegel
