

by Kristen Lepionka



boyfriend Brad Stockton—black and from the wrong side of the tracks—was convicted of the murders and is now on death row.




The Book of Salt by Monique Truong (Adult Fiction - Tr)

Marriage of a Thousand Lies by SJ Sindu (Adult Fiction - Sindu)




The Song of Achilles by Madeline Miller (Adult Fiction - Miller)


When Katie Met Cassidy by Camille Perry (Adult Fiction - Perri)

The Argonauts by Maggie Nelson (Adult Nonfiction - 800.92 Nelson Nel)



A transgender reporter's narrative tour through the surprisingly vibrant queer communities sprouting up in red states, offering a vision of a stronger, more humane America.




Headcase: LGBTQ Writers & Artists on Mental Health and Wellness

Transgender History: The Roots of Today's Revolution by Susan Stryker


