Allie was 7 years old when she learned her family was different and feared. Now, she struggles to claim her Muslim and Arabic heritage while finding her place as an American teenager.




Ida in the Middle by Nora Lester Murad (Y Murad)


Something More by Jackie Khalilieh (Y Khalili)

95 poems pay tribute to essential voices past and present that have the power to provoke us, lead us, and give us hope.




We Hunt the Flame by Hafsah Faizal (Y Faizal)
