


Love from A to Z by S.K. Ali

Lou Patterson reconnects with her neighbor and ex-best friend Sam Alvarez, now seniors in high school, after they rediscover their childhood bucket list.




A Phở Love Story by Loan Le (Y Le)

Bao and Linh have never even had a class. together—but after a chance encounter, sparks fly. Can this relationship survive their families' feud?




Rent a Boyfriend by Gloria Chao (Y Chao)
