Are you interested in reading some fiction centered around sports? The following books all have teenage main characters playing sports and learning about life.






Bruised by Tanya Boteju (Y Boteju)


Icebreaker by A. L. Graziadei (Y Graziad)


The Knockout by Sajni Patel (Y Patel)

After enduring a week of punishing tryouts and making the cut for the girls varsity field hockey team, new players must participate in a night of questionable bonding traditions and loyalty tests, orchestrated by the most senior girls on the squad and performed with the implicit permission of their seemingly all-American young male coach.



When It All Syncs Up by Maya Ameyaw (Y Ameyaw)

Ballet is Aisha's life. So when she's denied yet another lead at her elite academy because she doesn't "look" the part, she knows something has to change-the constant discrimination is harming her mental health. Aisha will have to find the strength within herself—and place her trust in others—to make her next move.



Why We Fly by Kimberly Jones, Gilly Segal (Y Jones)

Told from alternating points of view, Chanel and Eleanor's rocky start to senior year gets more complex when the cheerleading team kneels for the national anthem and each girl grapples with the consequences.



You Don't Have a Shot by Racquel Marie (Y Marie)


