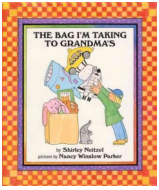
Predictable Books: Cumulative Story

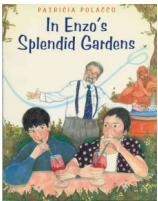
Poetically cumulative text and illustrations capture the relationships between plants and animals in the ecology of the Great Barrier Reef.

The big brown bear has no fear of a bad-tempered goose, a big pig, or even a wolf, but something very small causes him to run scared.

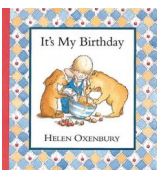


In Enzo's Splendid Gardens

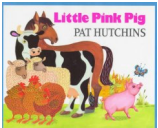
Cumulative text and illustrations depict what happens in Jack's garden after he plants his seeds.

(Juvenile Picture Books - Ej Hu)

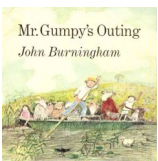
When it is time for bed, a little pink pig lags behind as his mother asks the horse, cow, sheep, and hens to help her find her child.

John Burningham

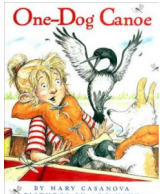

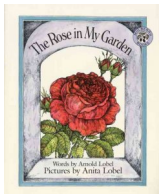
A girl and her dog set out in their canoe one morning, only to be insistently joined by a series of animals, large and small.

"Chicken Licken" is retold with illustrations of school children performing the story as a play on stage.

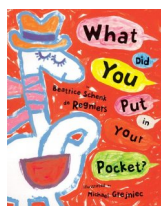


Today is Monday
