Children see a variety of animals, each one a different color, and a teacher looking at them.

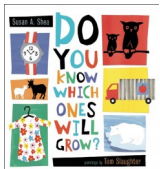


Do Princesses Wear Hiking Boots?

Poses rhyming questions on folded pages about what grows and what doesn't.

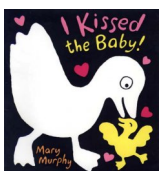


Does A Kangaroo Have A Mother, Too?

Rhyming questions and answers lead Ted the wolf from his bath into bed.

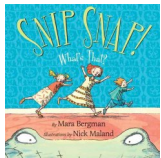


The Little Sleepyhead

A tired little boy searches for a place where he can sleep.

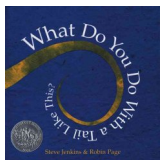


Snip Snap! : What's That?

(Juvenile Picture Books - Ej Be)

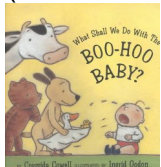
Three siblings are frightened by the wide mouth, long teeth, and strong jaws of the alligator who has crept up the stairs--until they decide they have had enough.

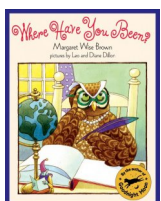


What Shall We Do With The Boo-Hoo Baby?

A dog, a cat, a duck, and a cow try to think of things to do to soothe a crying baby.

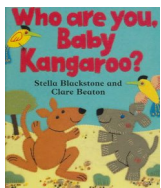


Where Have You Been?

(Juvenile Picture Books - Ej Bl)

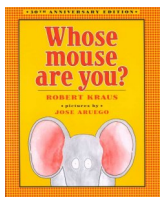
A curious puppy leads the reader to a number of animal babies in search of the name for a baby kangaroo. Includes notes on animal mothers and various infant animals.

A mother and daughter discover and identify animal footprints in the snow on an intimate walk through their farm.

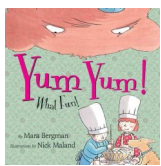


Whose Mouse Are You?
