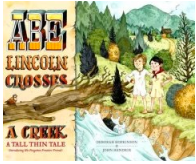

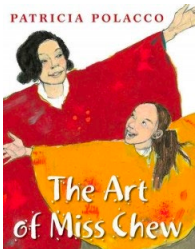

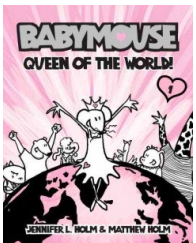

In Knob Creek, Kentucky, in 1816, seven-year-old Abe Lincoln falls into a creek and is rescued by his best friend, Austin Gollaher. Recommended for ages 6–9.



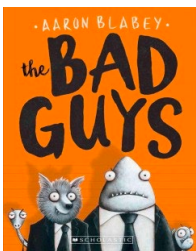
The Art of Miss Chew by Patricia Polacco (Juvenile Picture Books - Ej Pol)

Describes how a teacher named Miss Chew encouraged individuality, and accepted learning differences, and helped a young student with academic difficulties get extra time to take tests and permission to be in advanced art classes. Recommended for ages 6–9.



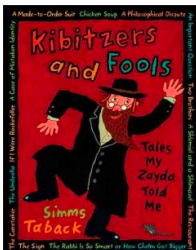
Babymouse: Queen of the World by Jennifer Holm (Juvenile Graphic Novels - J Holm)
Series: *Babymouse*

An imaginative mouse dreams of being queen of the world, but will settle for an invitation to the most popular girl's slumber party. Recommended for ages 6–9.



The Bad Guys by Aaron Blabey (Juvenile Fiction - J Blabey)
Series: *Bad Guys*

The Bad Guys—Mr. Wolf, Mr. Shark, Mr. Snake, and Mr. Piranha—want to be heroes, and they decide that the way to do it is to free the 200 dogs in the city dog pound—but their plan soon goes awry. Recommended for ages 6–9.



Kibitzers and Fools: Tales My Zayda Told Me by Simms Taback (Juvenile Nonfiction - J 398.208 Tab)

Thirteen humorous traditional Jewish tales, each accompanied by an appropriate saying. Recommended for ages 6–9.



Big Foot and Little Foot by Ellen Potter (Juvenile Fiction - J Potter)
Series: *Big Foot and Little Foot*

Hugo is a young Sasquatch who longs for adventure. Boone is young boy who longs to see a Sasquatch. When their worlds collide, they become the unlikely pair of best friends. Recommended for ages 6–9.



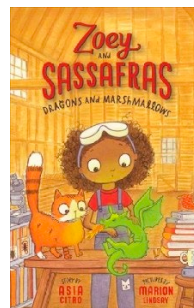
Captain Awesome and the Missing Elephants by Stan Kirby (Juvenile First Chapter Books - J Kirby)
Series: *Captain Awesome*

On a class field trip to the Sunnyview Memorial Zoo, Eugene McGillicuddy's favorite animals, the elephants, are missing! 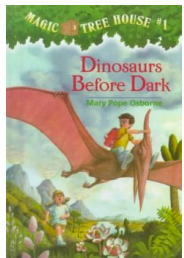
The Creature of the Pines by Adam Gidwitz (Juvenile Fiction - J Gidwitz)

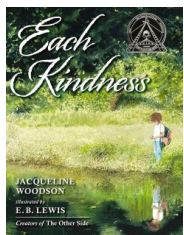


Dragons and Marshmallows by Asia Citro (Juvenile First Chapter Books - J Citro)
Series: *Zoey and Sassafras*

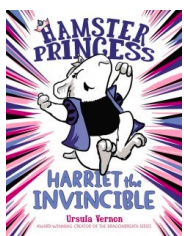

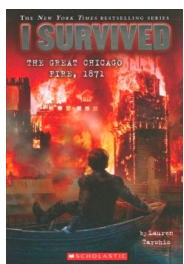
Dinosaurs Before Dark

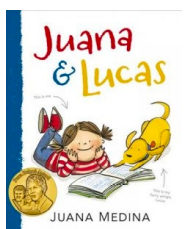
Each Kindness

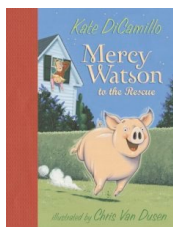
I Survived the Great Chicago Fire, 1871

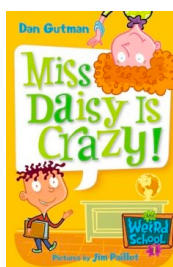
Juana & Lucas

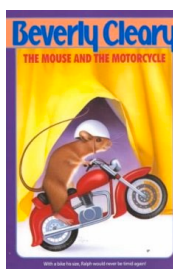
Just Joking: Jumbo—100 Giant Jokes & 1,000 Funny Photos Add Up to Big Laughs

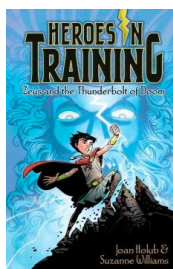
Miss Daisy is Crazy!
