

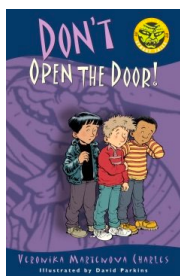

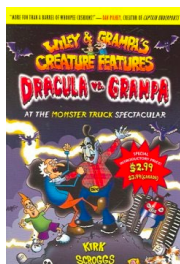

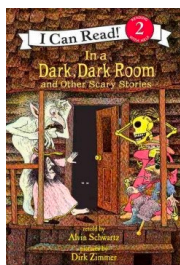
Don't Open the Door

Three young boys on a sleepover tell each other scary stories from around the world that feature goblins, wicked wooden dolls and an evil witch. Recommended for ages 6–9.



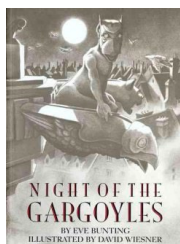
Dracula vs. Grampa at the Monster Truck Spectacular

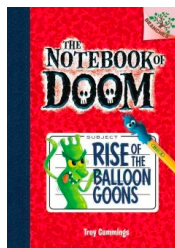


In a Dark, Dark Room, and Other Scary Stories

These books present seven scary stories to tell at night based on traditional stories and folktales from various countries. They are perfect for camp outs and sleepovers. Recommended for ages 6–9.



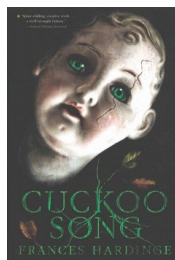
Night of the Gargoyles

(Juvenile First Chapter Books - J Cumming)

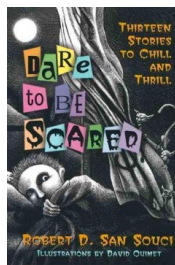
Series: *Notebooks of Doom*

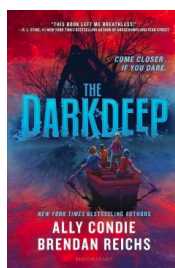
Cuckoo Song by Frances Hardinge

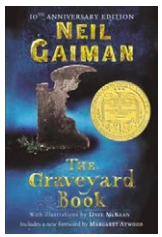
Dare to Be Scared by Robert San Souci

What would you do if you couldn't wake up from your scariest dreams? These tales take normal kids with normal lives that twist into a disturbing realm of horror. Recommended for ages 9–12.



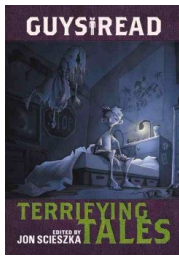
The Darkdeep

After the grisly murder of his entire family, a toddler wanders into a graveyard where the ghosts and other supernatural residents agree to raise him as one of their own. Recommended for ages 9–12.

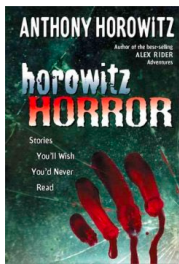


Guys Read: Terrifying Tales

by Anthony Horowitz

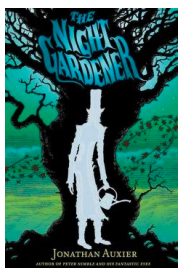

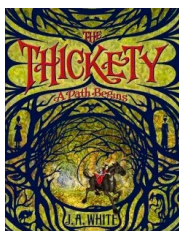
The Jumbies by Tracey Baptiste (Juvenile Fiction - J Baptist)

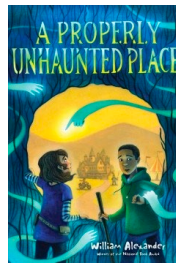
The Night Gardener

A Path Begins by J.A. White

When twelve-year-old Kara discovers her mother's grimoire in the dangerous forest, she must decide if she'll use it, even though such magic is forbidden. Recommended for ages 9–12.



A Properly Unhaunted Place
by William Alexander
(Juvenile Fiction - J Alexander)

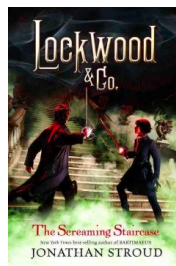
In a world full of ghosts, Rosa and Jasper live in the only unhaunted town—but must spring to action when they realize the ghosts are lying in wait to take the town back. (You might also enjoy the sequel, *A Festival of Ghosts*.) Recommended for ages 9–12.

Stories of ghosts and witches, "jump" stories, scary songs, and modern-day scary stories. Recommended for ages 9–12.

Follows three young operatives of a Psychic Detection Agency as they battle an epidemic of ghosts in London. Recommended for ages 9–12.



Small Spaces by Katherine Arden
(Juvenile Fiction - J Arden)

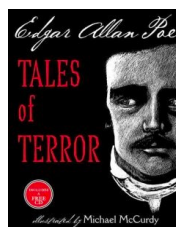
After eleven-year-old Ollie's school bus mysteriously breaks down on a field trip, she has to take a trip through scary woods, and must use all of her wits to survive. She must stick to small spaces. Recommended for ages 9–12.



Spirit Hunters by Ellen Oh
(Juvenile Fiction - J Oh)

Series: *Spirit Hunters*

Feeling uncomfortable from the moment she arrives in her new home, Harper is dismayed by local rumors that her house is haunted and that every family that has ever lived there has suffered terrible tragedies, a situation that turns sinister when her cheerful little brother begins acting in alarming ways. Recommended for ages 9–12.



Tales of Terror by Edgar Allan Poe
(Juvenile Fiction - J Poe)

Classic short stories from the master of horror, including "The Tell-Tale Heart" and "The Pit and the Pendulum." Recommended for ages 9–12.
